My plant looks like this:





These photos came with the following question (which has been condensed): "I purchased these from you in 2023. Everything was going well until February. I first noticed a bright pink color on the bottom of one of the streptocarpus. It than started spreading to the sides of the leaves. Removing the original leaf did not help. The rich, dark green shade of the leaves

changed also, some becoming paler. Today, a month later, I noticed the same pinkish hue on the bottom of the young leaves of my mini violet 'Jolly Jubilee'. I am worried I will lose these next "

Please don't discard (any more of) them. Some varieties, like the violet shown (you don't identify the streptocarpus) will have reddish undersides. This is very normal, and can be one of the attractive features of the plant--many varieties described as having "pink" variegation will have red undersides to the leaves.

If the light is strong, it will often bring out even more of the red/pink. This is true of many of the streptocarpus. They can get quite reddish if the light is very strong. Will guess that your light is pretty strong, especially since you say leaves are getting paler. As the plants look otherwise very healthy and the leaves are firm and of normal texture, what you are seeing is quite normal.

This month's question

I am having a problem with one of the large Russian African violet plants I purchased from you. I've had it for quite a while, but all of its leaves are drooping despite proper watering as in waiting for the soil to dry out. The only thing that changed was potting it a size up as it was getting quite large and drying out very frequently. I use perlite in the soil for good drainage and feed weekly with food designed for African violets.

If leaves are soft and drooping, this is likely a watering issue. If the soil feels moist and leaves are soft and drooping, then this is almost certainly so. When repotting, use a pot only just slightly larger than the existing root system. After doing so, proper watering is critical, as your plant needs time to get established and grow new roots into the extra soil in the larger pot. During this time, the soil needs to be moist but never wet. Very wet soil surrounding the smaller root ball can't be used until the plant has a chance to grow into and access it

Without knowing more, guessing this is the case here. It is very common for this to happen after repotting as we tend to want to water "well" a plant that's just been repotted-this can work in your garden, but won't for your potted violets. A good rule is to water based upon the size of the root ball, not the size of the pot. Once the root system begins to fill the larger pot, it will be able to consume more water and this is less a concern.
