Inventory updates.

My plant looks like this:



This photo came recently with the following question: "Just needed your advice on this violet I had bought from you. Actually, I have two of them and they are behaving similarly. The leaves are curved and not crisp looking. I have good light. Would this variety perhaps be needing more water than others? I have not transferred them to the double pots that I usually put violets in. I just water a small amount daily from the top."

Guessing they are just wilted and need more water--the surface of the soil in photo looks dry. You're likely being too careful not to overwater. You want to water the plant thoroughly (so that the entire root ball is wet), when the surface of the soil is "dry to the touch"--it appears that might be the case now. Then, wait until the soil surface is dry to the touch to water thoroughly again. The time between watering can vary based upon maturity and variety of plant--how quickly the variety grows, the size of root ball, and the size of plant above the soil that the roots have to supply with water. Environment will greatly affect this as well--temperature, humidity, air movement around the plant. Watering a measured amount on a fixed schedule may not match the amount of water your plant needs, when it needs it.

I'm guessing that if you are only giving a "small" amount from the top daily, it's likely that

only the soil surface is becoming moistened, and water never really gets down to the lower root ball. When you pot into your "double (self watering) pots", this won't be an issue, as the soil will be constantly wet when the reservoir is filled. Be sure you use lots of perlite, at least 50% by volume, in your potting mix, and use a pot size only slightly larger than the root ball of the plant when you repot into these pots.

This month's question

When I received my order, all seemed healthy and a few were in bloom. As is my custom, I isolated the new plants in humidity boxes. The next day, I lifted the lid off of one box and a fungus gnat flew off one plant. I was able to kill the gnat, and I isolated this humidity box over the weekend. Today, I removed the lid again and found more fungus gnats on the plant and soil. I am concerned that the gnats will infest my other plants. Is there a product that works well on fungus gnats? I have tried a product called Mosquito Bits and it didn't work at all. I would appreciate any advice.

Fungus gnats thrive in damp, moist, conditions. We will see a few here and there during times when this is the case in our growing area. Usually, this will be among plants that have been kept wet, intentionally or not, for an extended period--some of our "terrarium", and more "tropical" plants need to be kept more wet and with more humidity. We'll see more gnats appear among these.

We've heard differing opinions on 'Mosquito Bits' and the like. Some have success, others don't. We've never used them. As fungus gnats are mostly a nuisance, and won't harm your plants unless in VERY large numbers, I wouldn't worry about seeing a few. I certainly wouldn't use anything the lest bit toxic to rid your plants of them. Our apologies if any of our plants were their source. As fungus gnats need wetness (i.e. wet organic matter like the potting soil), to live and reproduce, removing these conditions, will remove the gnats. Though isolating new plants is always a good practice, keeping plants under a humidity dome is only providing them with what they want. We've found that allowing the soil surface to dry between waterings is enough to eliminate them over time.
