Ohio State AVS Convention Show.

Inventory updates.

Standard violet inventory recently updated. For those attending the open house, we plan to have selected varieties available only at that event, with a slightly different selection on each day.

My plant looks like this:



My last order of lovely little plants had 'Painted Silk' included. It's very healthy, but the crown is so tight, the blossoms can't penetrate the tangle of leaves! What's going wrong?

This unusual variety can be beautiful as can be seen by the photo on the website. The gold and green variegation is gorgeous, especially on the scalloped "girl" leaves. Varieties like this one, though, with wavy, curly, or heavily scalloped "girl" leaves, need to be handled a bit differently. Their leaves aren't as flat as on other varieties and won't shingle atop each other as nicely without your active intervention.

First, don't allow this variety (or those like it), to grow too many leaves. Excess older, outer, leaves need to be removed to make room for the newer growth. If not, they will only become an obstacle, and you'll have the tangled mess you see. Rather than laying (relatively) flat, new leaf edges catch the edges of older leaves, and become twisted or folded under. Removing the obstacles allows new growth to develop normally and lay flatter.

Don't pot these varieties too low into the pot as well. If growth has to grow up and over the pot rim, it will make twisting and bunching even more likely. You want leaves to grow "out", not "up". As shown, your plant doesn't have this problem.

Lastly, avoid growing varieties like this one under very intense light, as this will only encourage tighter, more bunched growth. A bit less light will produce "looser" growth, giving leaves room to lay down and not grow into each other. You still want enough light for blooming, however.

This month's question

I love Rex begonias, but after years of trying I still don't know if mine struggle and die because of too much or not enough water. Would using your wicking potting mix help? If not, how much water at a time would you use for a 4 inch pot one the top of the soil is dry? (from a longer thread, edited here).

You are correct that they require more exacting water. The ideal environment is about the same for most plants we grow, but the tolerance of swings in watering or environment is less. Rexes will tolerate less stress than rhizomatous (or tuberous) begonias because of their structure. Aim for moderation.

If you tend to water heavily, a "wicking" mix, which contains more perlite and is more porous, may help. We use it for many of our mature plants, which allows us to water them more liberally. As for "how much" to water, this is needs a more nuanced answer.

Good watering is a matter of judgement--how fast the plants and soil dries depends upon many things. Environment (heat, humidity, air movement), which can vary throughout the year, to begin with. Size and maturity of the plant (how much water it needs and consumes), size of pot or container (the volume of soil relative to root system), type of container (terra cotta is more porous than plastic or glazed), and the soil mix. The goal is moderation, however that can be achieved. The less variability in watering and soil moisture, the less the plant will be stressed and the better it will grow. Some plants can tolerate more stress from imperfect watering, like succulents, tuberous, or thick leaved plants. Some less, like those with fine, fibrous, roots and/or thin leaves and stems that don't retain much water in the plant tissues. Finally, each individual plant, like any living thing, can be a bit different. You only learn this by caring for them over time.

Watering is easy. Just turn a hose on over plants or flood a tray or saucer with water. GOOD watering is a skill. Being good at it requires experience and observation. We've had many, people work with us over the years, growing plants. Watering is the one thing that takes the longest to master, some never fully do. Usually, those that do it best, grow the nicest plants, all else equal.
